Dating, Love, and Marriage Bible Study Topics for not-yet-married couples How can I know whether this is the person to marry? 2023.01.13 – Week 3

Open Questions (ask more @ ljl.church/datingbiblestudy/askquestion):

Group Ice breakers:

- How would you determine if the person is the right person to marry?

The man who finds a wife finds a treasure, and he receives favor from the Lord. Proverbs 18:22 (NLT) -

Remember: God created marriage. It is good for a man and woman to become one.

Goals for couples:

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Your decision to marry is not dependent on the world's suggestions such as: compatibility (how would they know?) and even seemingly-godly aspects, such as the probability that both of you complement each other with characteristics to do God's will (you certainly will do with what God gave you!). Though, they may be factors, that is not your primary reason.

Until Engagement: (Seeking a mate)

- Both: Wait on the Lord. Men, act as the Lord directs. Women, respond. Both require patience, wrestling with God, and gives opportunity to reflect and seek counsel.
 - Men: when you believe the person is the one whom God wants you to marry go full out and win her heart • Pray asking God for help, guidance, and endurance.
 - Disregard all your personal changes you want to make about her. Accept her as she is.
 - The reason why you seek her marriage is because God says so. Your pursuit in life is to honor God, and if you have assurance, you ought to do all you can and trust God for the results.
- Women: spend time in groups (in safety) to get to know men as brothers. Learn to love God more as you wait.
 - When an interest arises, pray and seek God. Pray for the man to fall in love with you. Remember, your husband must lead the family after you marry.
 - Then the LORD God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper who is just right for him." Genesis 2:18 (NLT)
- Of course, it's often not that simple. When unsure someone is from God:
 - Both: Certainly, seek God in prayer and reflect with God using Scriptures.
 - Both: Fall back to a place of safety. Small groups. People who love God, who know you, love you, and want the best for you. (We ought to do the same when we are not sure about anything else in life!)
 - Welcome those who love God and you to endure with you (Love is patient, 1Corinthians 13:4) and carry your burdens (Galatians 6:2)
 - Other Scriptures to not stand alone in important decisions: Proverbs 15:22, Psalms 37:30-31, Proverbs 20:18, Proverbs 12:26, Proverbs 27:17, 1John 4:12, 16, John 15:12, Acts 4:32
 - Both: Take actions as God directs you. Trust God for the results and timing. It may not be immediate.
 Maybe God needs to work on you alone before you head toward marriage.

Now, engaged: (Both agree God called you to each other and want to marry)

- Seek other Christian brothers and sisters who know you (family, friends, and small groups) to bless your coming marriage. Any doubts, rely on and openly discuss with them. When ready, with each other.
- Seek to get married as soon as logistically possible. Don't let Satan add doubts by unnecessary delays.
 - Don't make "until I feel ready" as a constraint (You will never be really ready!). Only considerations should be logistics of others who would bless you.

Consider:

- Who did Abraham believe determines the **best person** for his only son to marry? (v. 1-9)
- How did the servant navigate when he was **uncertain** on how to find the mate? (v. 10-14)
- What did the servant do when he felt she may be the one? (v. 17, 21-28)
- Who initiated the approval and blessings from the woman's parents and family? (v. 33-53)
- What actions did Rebekah take throughout this story? (v. 15-20, 24-25, 28, 58-61)

Questions for discussion:

- Today, should women lead in the engagement process? Women proposing ok? If so, what should men's role be?
- Does today's cultural *sex-before-marriage* and *living together before marriage* impact lack of men's leadership?
- What are the necessary key conversations before marriage? (What can "make or break" the decision to marry?)
- What should we do when parents do not bless the marriage?
- Consider a married couple. Should the woman lead the family under certain circumstances?
- What is your view on feminism? Does feminism hurt, support, or is neutral to building strong & healthy families?
- For the Married: How do you maintain your first love that you enjoyed before marriage? Does it matter today?

Actions to Take:

- Let your decisions be based on your trust in God for the one person you will love/respect for the rest of your life.
 - Men, be ready to lead by getting on your knees and seeking direction. Take actions as God directs you.
 - Women, respond. Direct to a dialogue. Seek God and clarify.
 - Fall back to small groups to walk with you through your decision-making
- After engagement, coordinate with others who will bless you, then get married as soon as logistically possible.

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
